## **Power of Attorney**

Since our last edition of the newsletter, we have delivered presentations on the application process for Power of Attorney, to groups in Newarthill and Shotts. These have generated a healthy level of interest resulting in 5 positive interactions with people wanting to proceed with their POA applications. Also, 2 out of these 5 were possibly looking to instruct mirror POAs with their spouses. This was from one group only, and is evidence of the importance of these presentations. We have a number of presentations booked for the coming months and these will continue at intervals throughout the year.

## Social Security Scotland Benefits for Older People

VoEF also deliver presentations on the Social Security benefits available to older people who are resident in Scotland. These are worth keeping up with as new benefits are being introduced seasonally.

#### **Consultations**

VoEF have been coordinating North Lanarkshire's response to the Proposed Bill for a Commissioner for Older People for Scotland.

Currently, the non Government Bills Team are reviewing the responses and compiling a report which they hope to publish in the New Year. Colin Smyth (MSP for South Scotland Scottish Labour) will bring forward a Bill later in the year. Once we hear the outcome, we will be sure to feed back the impact of our consultation to our members.

one' steering group to ensure that residents within the over 60's community in North Lanarkshire are represented fully in the discussions around service provision.

### Rabbie Does Strictly - Tea Dance with Falls Prevention















Voice of Experience Forum, in partnership with NHS Lanarkshire's Health Improvement Team and the Falls Prevention Team, delivered a community event whose aims included beating the blues on Blue Monday, tackling social isolation and loneliness in older people, increasing the awareness of falls prevention and safety and raising awareness of the impacts of alcohol.

The event was funded by Community Solutions via the Bellshill, Motherwell, and Wishaw & Shotts consortiums. Initially, 81 people registered for the event however, due to temperatures falling to  $-4^{\circ}$  on the day, 59 guests attended, an outstanding turnout given the conditions underfoot! Attendees were accompanied by 18 stallholders who provided a wide range of supports aimed at improving health and well-being and reducing the risks of trip hazards in the home.

The event was a roaring success and Rabbie himself would have been proud of the turnout and more so in the participation of those attending.

The evaluations which were completed were evidence of the multiple benefits of the event in providing an educative and fun experience while raising awareness of the contributary factors and risks in the home environment.



Everyone took part in strength and balance exercises and after lunch, music was provided by a DJ and a large dance floor allowed for people to get up and strut their stuff, which they gladly accepted. Elvis even made an appearance! A great time was had by all.

## **SCAM ALERT!**

#### Age Scotland Impersonation Scam



#### The Scam

**Right Care Right Place** 

Age Scotland has warned the public to be wary of cold callers who say they work for the organisation. Scammers will say that you are eligible to receive a £500 grant from Age Scotland and ask you to provide your contact details and bank account information.

#### **How to Avoid**

Don't give any details to a cold caller. If you are unsure whether a call from an organisation is legitimate, hang up and contact the organisation using a number found on their website or in an official directory.

Never give a cold caller any personal information, even if they already have some of your details. Be wary of any cold call where you are offered a grant, prize or anything else that sounds too good to be true.

Contact your bank immediately if you think you may have given your account details to a scammer.
